CITY MANAGER'S OFFICE

- *News and Notes for the Second Half of April 2015*
 - *Week of April 20 through April 24*
 - *During the morning of April 20th, I had my weekly City issues meeting with Mayor Musser and participated in a video shoot with CGI Communications for a series of "Welcome to Upland" videos that will be posted on the City's web site. Upland has participated in the CGI video program in the past as the program is offered to the City at no charge.*
 - *On Tuesday, April 21st, I had my individual status update meetings with Treasurer Dan Morgan, Community Services Director Roberta Knighten, and Development Services Director Jeff Zwack. We also had our weekly Executive Team meeting on Tuesday morning.*
 - *Tuesday afternoon's schedule included a meeting with Andrew Knudson of McKinstry, which is a firm that helps cities and counties identify opportunities for greater efficiencies in the areas of utility costs, building maintenance, and infrastructure development.*

- *Wednesday's meetings included an individual status update with Interim Finance Manager Scott Williams, as well as a meeting with Fire Chief Rick Mayhew and Councilmember Debbie Stone to discuss the upcoming transition in leadership at the Fire Department upon Chief Mayhew's retirement.*
- *On Wednesday morning, I attended a League of California Cities (Inland Empire Division) Legislative Task Force meeting in Ontario regarding current options for the regulation of medical marijuana dispensaries. Mayor Pro Tem Bozar, Chief Brian Johnson, and Captain Tony Yoakum also attended with me. Those in attendance heard presentations from attorney Jeff Dunn and a League of California Cities legislative analyst.*
- *On Wednesday afternoon, I participated in a meeting with Jeff Zwack, Chief Brian Johnson, Fire Chief Rick Mayhew, Roberta Knighten, Councilmember Carol Timm, former Councilmember Dave Stevens, and Steve Ipson to discuss the possibility of the Cooper Museum sponsoring another Oktoberfest event in Historic Downtown Upland later this fall. Most of the discussion centered on fees charged for City services to support the event.*
- *On Wednesday evening, I attended most of the Planning Commission workshop regarding the General Plan and Zoning Code update.*
- *On Thursday morning, April 23rd, I had the honor of presenting the Employee of the Quarter and Department of the Year awards in a special ceremony at City Hall. We had a great turnout of employees, good food, and a chance to recognize some of the folks who work very hard for the City throughout the year. The Public Works Department was honored as Department of the Year for 2014.*
- *On Friday afternoon, April 25th, I spent about three hours checking out the festivities at the 2015 Lemon Festival. Special thanks to new Police Chief Brian Johnson for spending some time with me on Friday afternoon making the rounds at the Festival and introducing himself to a wide range of folks.*
- *Week of April 27th through May 1st*
 - *Monday morning's meetings included individual sessions with Councilmember Timm and Mayor Musser to review questions on the April 27th City Council meeting agenda and a meeting with Russ Branson and Catherine Flaming of Public Financial Management (PFM) to discuss their progress on the City's new Five-Year Financial Plan.*
 - *On Monday afternoon, I met with the City's labor negotiations team to discuss the schedule and initial strategy for the upcoming labor negotiations with all seven employee bargaining units.*
 - *On Monday night I attended the April 27th City Council meeting, which included the swearing-in ceremony for new Police Chief Brian Johnson.*
 - *The morning of Tuesday, April 28th, included the weekly Executive Team meeting and an individual meeting with Treasurer Dan Morgan.*

- *On Tuesday morning, I also participated in a meeting with Public Works Director Rosemary Hoerning and representatives of Southern California Edison, including Lydia Roman. We discussed some of SCE's plans for electrical infrastructure upgrades in Upland over the next year.*
- *On Wednesday morning, April 29th, Jeff Zwack, Rosemary Hoerning, and I met with Upland attorney Jason Gaudy at his Downtown Upland office. We discussed a variety of issues and ideas related to improving Downtown Upland. Following that meeting, Interim Finance Manager Scott Williams and I met with Jason Gaudy to discuss the Upland Fiscal Reform and Accountability Act, an idea that came out of the Fiscal Reform Task Force on which Jason served as a member.*
- *Wednesday also included an individual department status meeting with Administrative Services Director Stephanie Mendenhall, and a discussion of the Fiscal Year 2015-2016 Police Department budget with Scott Williams and Chief Johnson.*
- *John Bartel of Bartel Associates was in town on Wednesday afternoon to meet with Scott Williams and me. Mr. Bartel is a well-known actuary and financial consultant who is working with the City to identify strategies to help us deal effectively with our long-term CalPERS pension liabilities.*
- *Meetings on Thursday, April 30th, included a talk with former Police Chief and City Manager Marty Thouvenell, a discussion with Fire Chief Rick Mayhew and Councilmember Carol Timm regarding the upcoming Fire Chief transition, and a get acquainted meeting with Steve Samuelian of California Consulting, one of the firms that is interested in doing grant-writing work for the City of Upland.*

- *On Tuesday, an officer contacted two transients at Memorial Park, both were arrested for warrants. The officer also arranged for Public Works staff to pick up approximately two truckloads of abandoned property scattered throughout the park.*
- *On Wednesday, an officer located an occupied stolen vehicle in the south end of the City. The driver yielded in Ontario and was arrested without incident. The driver was booked at the county jail for driving a stolen vehicle, possession of stolen property and possession of burglary tools.*

- *On Sunday, officers responded to an apartment complex regarding shots heard in the area. While responding, a caller stated a bullet had struck his wall. No one was injured and there was no suspect seen. A report was taken for shooting at an inhabited dwelling.*
- *On Sunday, officers responded to a call of a beer theft, which had just occurred from a convenience store. Officers located the suspect in the area and recovered the property. The suspect was arrested for theft.*

- *Book-Enders is a reading club where each month a different book is read. For May, the book *Eva Luna* by Isabella Allende was discussed among the group.
