CITY MANAGER'S OFFICE

- *News and Notes from the Month of June 2015*
 - *Week of June 1st through June 5rd:*
 - *During the morning of June 1st, I had my weekly City issues meeting with Mayor Musser.*
 - *Monday afternoon's schedule included a meeting with Steve Lambert of the 20/20 Network and representatives of Frontier Communities. Frontier is currently building the Magnolia Heights community in the Colonies area of Upland, and they are evaluating additional sites within Upland for future projects. Frontier is a homebuilder based in Rancho Cucamonga.*
 - *Monday afternoon also included the monthly meeting of the City Council's Finance and Economic Development Committee. During this meeting, Russ Branson of Public Financial Management (PFM) made the first presentation of the City's Five-Year Financial Plan. The Five-Year Plan provides a financial model and accompanying software that can be used by City staff and the City Council to set budget boundaries and analyze the impacts of various spending and revenue trends in the years ahead.*
 - *Tuesday morning included my weekly meeting with Treasurer Dan Morgan, department status update meetings with Community Services Director Roberta Knighten and Police Chief Brian*

Johnson, and the weekly Executive Team meeting, which this week included our “First Tuesday” gathering of the entire management and mid-management group.

- *On Tuesday afternoon, I had a meeting with Jeff Zwack, Councilmember Carol Timm, and planning consultant John Atwater to discuss the SANBAG/Metrolink land use issues involving the SANBAG-owned properties in Historic Downtown Upland.*
- *Also on Tuesday afternoon Jeff Zwack and I met with representatives of CGM Development to discuss the firm’s potential development of a new medical office building on Foothill Boulevard. Final plans have not yet been submitted.*
- *Wednesday morning’s meetings included individual department status updates with Fire Chief Rick Mayhew and Public Works Director Rosemary Hoerning. Interim Finance Manager Scott Williams and I also met to discuss the progress of the Fiscal Year 2015-2016 budget and related issues.*
- *On Wednesday afternoon, I met with Jeff Zwack, Tonya Pace, and Steve Lambert to discuss public outreach strategies related to the Upland General Plan Update. I also met with Angelic Bird of the Upland/Montclair Fire Department to learn more about her background and her new role with Upland. Angelic, who is a City of Montclair employee, will be providing emergency preparedness services for Upland as one of the new shared Fire positions approved by the Montclair and Upland City Councils.*
- *On Thursday, June 4, I attended the SANBAG City Managers Technical Advisory Committee meeting in San Bernardino. During the morning, and in the afternoon I met with Barbara Taylor of the Public Works Department and Steve Lambert of the 20-20 Network to discuss the City’s public communication strategies related to water conservation.*

- Summary:
 - *On Sunday, officers responded to a bike theft that had just occurred. Officers located the suspect in the area. He was arrested for theft.*
 - *Early Sunday morning, officers responded to a call of subjects fighting at a local bar. Upon arrival, officers observed two subjects fighting in the alley behind the bar. One of the subjects was arrested for fighting and being drunk in public.*
 - *On Sunday, a female called stating she was just assaulted by her adult son. Officers arrived and arrested him for battery and an outstanding warrant.*
 - *On Monday evening, officers responded to a disturbance between a boyfriend and girlfriend. The female was able to tell Dispatch the male told her he was going to make the police shoot him. When officers arrived, they heard the male yelling that he was going to shoot someone. After a few minutes,*

officers were able to get the male to come out and he was placed on a psychological hold and transported to the behavioral health unit.

- *On Monday, a liquor store clerk got into an argument with a customer. The customer threatened he was going to go get a gun and he would return and shoot the clerk. Officers arrived and were able to detain the subject. He was arrested for criminal threats and taken to jail.*
 - *On Monday, officers responded to a call of a naked man masturbating in a business. The informant contacted the naked man and told him to leave. When the naked man got outside, he attacked the informant and threw a rock at him, and took off running. The informant retrieved a bat from his vehicle and followed behind the man. The naked man stopped running and tried to attack the informant a second time. The naked man was struck in the arm with the bat. The man was arrested for assault with a deadly weapon and indecent exposure.*
 - *Late Thursday night, an officer recognized a motorcycle traveling west on Foothill near Campus as being stolen. When the rider tried to flee, a vehicle pursuit was initiated. The suspect crashed at low speed when he applied his brakes too hard and went over the handlebars. He tried to run on foot but was captured a short distance away. The suspect was arrested and booked for being in possession of the stolen motorcycle, felony evading, and two felony probation warrants.*
 - *On Friday, an officer made a traffic stop on a vehicle that was found to be stolen. The male driver was arrested for grand theft auto, possession of stolen property, possession of methamphetamine and an outstanding warrant.*
 - *On Friday, the Upland Police Department SMASH team conducted a proactive enforcement detail. Eight officers and one supervisor went to several different neighborhoods where there have been recent spikes in criminal activity. They also assisted the Detective Bureau in looking for a wanted subject. During the operation, there were 33 traffic stops, 34 subject checks, 2 gang cards completed, 1 vehicle towed, 3 citations issued and 10 arrests made for various violations.*
 - *On Saturday, officers responded to a male beating up another male. Officers arrived and determined a transient asked a couple for money and after they refused, he began hitting their vehicle with a piece of metal. He then began hitting the male victim in the head with it. The suspect was located in the area and arrested for assault with a deadly weapon, vandalism, and violation of probation.*

▪ **Summary:**

- *On Sunday morning, officers were sent to a local motel to investigate a disturbance. Upon arrival, the officers contacted a male and female who were involved in a domestic dispute. The male was subsequently arrested for domestic violence, vandalism, and for damaging a telephone to prevent domestic violence reporting. The male was booked into the county jail.*
- *On Monday, officers conducted extra patrol at Memorial Park. They located a transient that had a No-Bail warrant for his arrest issued by the San Bernardino County Probation Department. The subject was arrested and found to be in possession of methamphetamine and drug paraphernalia. The subject was booked at West Valley Detention Center.*
- *On Tuesday night, UPD received a report from CPS about a “doomsday prepper” involved in an on-going child custody case. He had told the court mediator he owned numerous firearms, he believed the world was about to end, and he would not allow the mother to take the children. Officers responded and were able to detain the subject. They confirmed he owned numerous rifles and shotguns. A judge granted the temporary seizure of the firearms and an emergency protective order, and CPS handled the child custody issue between the parents.*
- *On Tuesday night, officers were sent to a store for an armed robbery. A male suspect tried stealing items when he was confronted by a loss prevention employee. The suspect brandished a knife at the loss prevention employee, dropped the stolen merchandise, and fled on a bicycle. Officers were unable to locate the suspect after an area check with the helicopter and with the assistance of a police dog from another law enforcement agency.*
- *On Wednesday, a female was choked unconscious by her boyfriend. After coming to, she was able to flee the residence on foot. The male suspect caught up to the victim in his vehicle and forced her inside where he punched her repeatedly. Once again, the victim escaped the vehicle and got into a passing motorists’ vehicle. The Good Samaritan called 911 for the victim. Officers responded and located the male suspect. He was booked into the county jail for felony domestic violence, kidnapping, and false imprisonment. The victim sustained a laceration to the back of her head.*
- *On Friday, officers responded to a local hospital for a female causing a disturbance and refusing to leave. She was arrested for an outstanding warrant.*

- *On Friday, officers responded to a call of a male drinking alcohol while in his underwear in a neighbor's yard. Officers responded and contacted the male who was arrested for being under the influence of a narcotic.*
- *On Friday, a stolen vehicle drove through a license plate reader. The vehicle was stopped and the sole occupant/driver was arrested for grand theft auto and possession of stolen property.*
- *On Saturday, a male suspect fired approximately 6 to 10 rounds from a semi-automatic rifle into a brick wall in the alley of 800 Orchid Court. The shots were fired during a 4th of July celebration. The man fled the area. Responding officers contacted witnesses who gave information that may lead to the identification of the suspect. The investigation is ongoing.*

▪ *Summary:*

- *On Sunday, officers responded to a call of a male drinking alcohol and smoking marijuana in a park. Officers contacted him and cited him for open container in the park.*
- *On Monday night, officers were dispatched to a report of a man masturbating in public. Officers located the suspect and arrested him for indecent exposure, as well as several outstanding arrest warrants.*
- *On Monday night, a citizen had his bike stolen by two suspects near the bike path. The suspects hit the victim and simulated a weapon in their pocket. Officers responding to the area located two subjects matching the suspect descriptions and detained them. These subjects were positively identified by the victim and arrested for strong-arm robbery.*
- *On Tuesday, officers responded to a call of a driver smoking drugs while driving. Officers located the car and arrested the driver for a warrant and drunk driving.*
- *On Tuesday evening, a transient approached a female adult near the soccer fields in an Upland park. The transient touched the woman inappropriately and tried to kiss her. Officers responded and located the suspect nearby. He was arrested for sexual battery and booked at the jail.*
- *On Wednesday evening, officers were dispatched to a downtown bar regarding a female patron who had assaulted a waitress. When officers located her, she tried to fight them as well, and had to be restrained with a hobble device. Officers discovered she also had multiple prior DUI arrests. The male she was drinking with was also arrested for a prior no bail warrant for obstructing the police.*
- *On Wednesday night, officers responded to an apartment complex to investigate a report of a man who threatened to shoot his relative and had been seen with a handgun. Officers tried to approach a subject matching the suspect description who tried to flee on foot. Officers used a taser to subdue him, only to find out he was the suspect's friend. The gun, a .32 caliber handgun, was recovered on his person. He was arrested for delaying the officers and possession of a concealed firearm. The original suspect was located nearby and taken into custody as well. He was charged with multiple felonies.*
- *Early Thursday morning, a citizen reported a male suspect was trying to break into his car. Officers responded and located the burglar. He was arrested for burglary and possession of burglary tools.*
- *On Thursday night, UPD was notified by the Ontario PD helicopter that the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department was in pursuit in the area of 19th & Mountain.
