### CITY MANAGER'S OFFICE

- *WEEK-AT-A-GLANCE: For the Week of August 3 through August 7, 2015:*
  - *This week we had two meetings of the City Council Ad Hoc Committee Regarding Sales Tax Sharing. We appreciate the willingness of Mayor Musser and Mayor Pro Tem Bozar to serve on this committee. Our discussions were very productive, and it appears that we have agreement with Ford of Upland on an updated deal that will pave the way for the dealership to pursue its relocation on an aggressive timeline. The updated agreement will come before the full City Council in a special meeting at the end of this month.*
  - *The City Council Ad Hoc Committee Regarding Animal Services also met this week, immediately following the Finance and Economic Development Committee meeting. Mayor Pro Tem Bozar and Councilmember Stone are serving on this committee. They requested some additional information from Roberta Knighten and Scott Williams that will help the Committee with its discussions over the next few weeks. There was also brief discussion about which stakeholders should be added to the Committee to make the discussions as productive as possible before the Animal Services budget issue returns to the full City Council.*

- *The Fire Chief recruitment is proceeding well. We are now down to four finalists who will be returning to Upland next week (week of August 10th) to compete in the next phase of the process, which is being modeled after the successful recruitment that led us to former Chief Mayhew in early 2013.*
- *New Deputy City Manager Jeannette Vagnozzi is scheduled to start her work in Upland on Wednesday, August 19th. Scott Williams will be moving into the old Stephanie Mendenhall office/workspace so that Jeannette can have the office/workspace in the City Manager's area where Christa Buhagiar and Scott have been working over the last year. This was Jeannette's choice, and I think it makes sense for a number of reasons.*
- *I had a good meeting with Loren Sanchez and Wes Fifield of the Scheu Family YMCA Board this week to discuss the progress of their aquatics facility project. Their fundraising efforts are moving forward well, and we are down to the last couple of planning/building issues on the facility itself, which we believe can be resolved by the end of the month.*
- *On Monday evening, we discussed the new Economic Development Action Plan with the Finance and Economic Development Committee. The Committee had some questions and wants to discuss the Action Plan one more time. I anticipate that it will be introduced to the full City Council no later than October.*
- *Many thanks to Police Chief Johnson for allowing me to tag along with him during the National Night Out festivities on Tuesday night. Clergy Council member Pastor Julius West joined us as well.*

- Summary:
  - *On Sunday, officers responded to a call of a husband who had choked his wife and pushed his eight-year-old son. The husband was arrested for felony domestic violence, as well as child abuse. An emergency restraining order was also obtained.*
  - *On Monday, officers responded to a call of a male who was possibly under the influence and had assaulted his ex-girlfriend. Officers arrived and arrested him for domestic violence.*
  - *On Tuesday, an officer was conducting extra patrol near City Hall regarding transient related problems. The officer located one transient and cited him for drinking alcohol in public.*
  - *On Thursday evening, an officer was driving through a park. The officer recognized a known drug dealer/user and stopped to talk to him and a couple of his friends. While searching the drug dealer's vehicle, the officer located heroin, methamphetamine, syringes and stolen property from over ten vehicle burglaries from other cities. Two subjects were arrested and booked at the West Valley Detention Center on various charges.*
  - *On Thursday evening, a woman came in to the lobby to report possible neglect to her grandson. She told officers she spoke to her daughter on the phone and her daughter said her son's arm was accidentally burned the previous day. Officers drove to the apartment and contacted the mother and her son. The son had a small burn on his arm. The officer took a case for child neglect and contacted the Department of Children's Services.*
  - *On Friday, a stolen car went through a license plate reader. An officer located the vehicle occupied in the area. A male and female were arrested for grand theft auto and the stolen vehicle was recovered.*
  - *On Friday evening, an officer stopped a vehicle for a minor traffic violation. During the traffic stop, the officer searched the vehicle. During the search, the officer located a sellable quantity of methamphetamine and numerous photocopies of driver's licenses and credit cards. The subject was arrested for possession of a controlled substance for sale and identity theft related charges.*
  - *On Friday, officers conducted numerous probation and parole checks throughout the City; as a result, 11 subjects were arrested.*
  - *On Saturday, officers were sent to a business for a transient living in the back. Officers arrived and arrested the male for warrants and illegal lodging.*
  - *With the coordinated efforts of the Narcotics Task Force, Code Enforcement, and the property management company, we have been successful in closing another medical marijuana dispensary (MMD) without the involvement of the City Attorney's Office. Primarily due to a responsible property management company taking the lead with an eviction process, a walk through was conducted and Emerald City Wellness, aka EWC, operating at 270 E. 7th Street, #1D has completely moved out. The owner has been issued three Administrative Citations from Code Enforcement.*
- Traffic Division:
  - *No Grant activity during this reporting period.*

- **Investigations Division:**
  - *110 cases were assigned and/or investigated by Detectives during this activity period.*
- **Narcotics Task Force:**
  - *During this period, the narcotics unit responded to a complaint of a subject selling illegal narcotics in the area of Upland High School to students. As a result of their investigation, the narcotics unit was able to arrest the subject for sales of a controlled substance and confiscate illegal narcotics.*

  - *On July 22nd, 22 German exchange students were given a tour of the Upland Police Department.*
  - *On July 16th, the Chief met with Kaua'I PD Assistant Chief Michael Contreras. They discussed contemporary policing and policy issues. KPD is currently in final product evaluation for a new CAD/RMS software purchase. They will provide UPD with a copy of their RFP findings.*
  - *On July 24th, the Chief met with Honolulu PD Chief Louis Kealoha. They talked about the role of a Police Chief and policing best practices. He also conducted a site visit to review their CAD/RMS system.*

▪ **Summary:**

- *Early Saturday morning, officers walked through Memorial Park. Six subjects were cited for being in the park after hours and one was cited for possession of marijuana.*
- *Early Sunday morning, officers walked through Memorial Park. Eight subjects were cited for being in the park after hours.*
- *On Sunday, an officer conducting extra patrol regarding transients arrested three individuals living behind a business. All were cited for illegal lodging.*
- *On Sunday, officers were dispatched to a shopping center in reference to a man with a gun call. The man was located and found to be in possession of 46 grams of methamphetamine. The suspect was booked for felon in possession of a handgun and possession of methamphetamine for sale.*

- *On Monday, a male came into the lobby of the police station to obtain a release for his vehicle that had been impounded. The male was found to have two warrants for assault and domestic violence. He was arrested and booked at the county jail.*
- *On Monday, officers were sent to a call of a female standing in the street that was bleeding from her nose. Officers arrived and learned the female had been assaulted. A male adult was located and arrested for felony domestic violence.*
- *On Monday, a stolen vehicle went through a stationary license plate reader. The vehicle was located and recovered. The driver was arrested for grand theft auto and felon in possession of ammunition.*
- *On Monday, officers were sent to a disturbance at a residence. When they arrived, they learned a male adult had assaulted his girlfriend. He was arrested for felony domestic violence.*

▪ **Summary:**


- *Summary:*
