CITY MANAGER'S OFFICE

- **WEEK-AT-A-GLANCE:** *For the Period of August 10 through August 31, 2015*
 - *During the week of August 10th, I met with Mayor Musser and Councilmember Timm to discuss the August 10th City Council meeting agenda, had my regular weekly meeting with City Treasurer Dan Morgan, participated as an observer in the Fire Chief assessment center exercise, conducted individual interviews with each of the three Fire Chief finalists, and attended the monthly Upland Chamber of Commerce Governmental Relations and Economic Development Forum.*
 - *I was on vacation during the week of August 17th - 21st, enjoying a quick trip to Northern California to visit friends and former staff at the two cities where I served as City Manager previously: Patterson and Crescent City.*
 - *During the week of August 24th, I attended the grand opening of the San Bernardino Transit Center with Mayor Musser, continued work on the final stages of the Fire Chief recruitment process, had a working lunch with Montclair City Manager Ed Starr, had several meetings with members of the Executive Team, including new Deputy City Manager Jeannette Vagnozzi, attended the Planning Commission meeting, and attended the Animal Services Ad Hoc Committee meeting.*

- *During the month of August, we received detailed information from the office of San Bernardino County Assessor Bob Dutton on the 2015 property assessment roll. The news for Upland was very good, with the City experiencing a 5.0% increase in total assessed valuation from 2014 to 2015. Upland's assessed valuation is now over \$8 billion dollars. In San Bernardino County only Chino, Chino Hills, Fontana, Ontario, Rancho Cucamonga, and San Bernardino have higher assessed valuations than Upland. Of course, most of those cities are significantly larger in geographic size and population than Upland. Upland's growth rate (5.0%) tracked very closely with our West End neighbors: Rancho Cucamonga (5.0%), Ontario (5.0%), and Montclair (3.9%). We watch property tax information closely because property taxes are the City's number one General Fund revenue source.*

▪ Summary:

- *On Sunday afternoon, officers responded to a call of a subject yelling at employees inside of a local restaurant. The informant believed the subject was mentally unstable or under the influence of drugs. The subject told the employees that if the police showed up, he would kill himself. When officers arrived, the subject intentionally ran out onto Foothill Boulevard and was struck by a vehicle that was traveling approximately 40 miles per hour. He was transported to the hospital and is expected to recover.*
- *On Sunday, an officer contacted a subject known to sell heroin and who is on parole for residential burglary. The officer located drug paraphernalia and a scale with heroin residue on it. The officer contacted State Parole and they placed a parole hold on the suspect. The suspect was booked at the county jail for a parole violation and possession of drug paraphernalia.*
- *On Monday, an officer assisted Montclair Police in the area of the bike path and Monte Vista Ave. where an elaborate transient camp was located just inside the city limits. Public Works was contacted and assisted by removing two truckloads of abandoned property. There were no transients at the camp at the time; however, officers will monitor the location to assure it does not re-populate.*
- *On Monday afternoon, UPD officers stopped an occupied car that had been stolen in LA. When the car was searched, they recovered two handguns and drugs in the car. Follow-up on the guns showed they had been stolen in an unreported burglary in Pasadena. The owner of the guns was contacted and told the investigating officer he was out of town and not aware of the theft until UPD notified him. The suspects were arrested for multiple felony charges.*
- *On Tuesday morning, a vehicle went through a fixed license plate reader. It was wanted by Southgate Police Department for its connection in an attempted murder, kidnapping, and assault with a deadly weapon case. Officers found the vehicle and detained the two occupants. Southgate Police Department responded and took the occupants and the vehicle for further investigation.*
- *On Tuesday night, officers stopped another occupied stolen car. The driver was on PRCS probation for criminal threats. He was arrested for being in possession of the stolen car.*
- *On Thursday morning, a theft occurred at a large hardware store. Officers and detectives were familiar with the suspect/vehicle description and knew of a pattern of similar thefts being committed by the male/female team. Due to their operation of stealing and quickly pawning, the loot led officers to a local pawnshop. Upon arrival, it was learned the team had just been at the pawnshop with the stolen merchandise. Although no arrest was made today, the detectives will very soon.*
- *On Thursday afternoon, a male was seen walking along Foothill Blvd. carrying a firearm. Several callers watched and followed this subject as he pointed the weapon in the air. Officers caught up with the male and learned the weapon was an air soft BB gun. The male was found to be wanted out of San Diego and arrested.*

- *On Thursday, an officer came upon a traffic accident in a residential neighborhood. The investigating officer learned a drunk driver had struck 4 parked cars. The driver was booked at the county jail for DUI and a DUI warrant.*
- *On Saturday, officers conducted an auto burglary investigation that led to the arrest of the suspect. He was booked for burglary.*
- *On Saturday, officers responded to a shooting at a bar. A group of 30 to 40 patrons were fighting outside of the bar when it closed. One suspect fired 12 to 15 shots. A victim sustained a minor injury. The investigation is ongoing.*

- **Summary:**
 - *On Sunday morning, officers were called to a vehicle theft where the grandson of the vehicle owner was seen taking the car. Officers were able to track down the thief and arrest him for Grand Theft Auto.*
 - *Very early Sunday morning, a call was received from a male who was out of breath and having difficulty speaking to the dispatcher. This male was able to relay that subjects had broken into his home before the phone line was disconnected. Neighbors also began calling stating they could hear screaming and banging noises coming from inside the original caller's residence. Officers immediately responded to*

the home where they located the male caller home alone. The residence was checked for signs of a break-in with negative results. After talking with the male a little longer, he was subsequently placed on a psychiatric hold and taken to Arrowhead Regional Hospital for some needed help.

- *On Sunday morning, a citizen witnessed a male juvenile tagging a business in the area of Foothill/Euclid. UPD officers responded and located a subject matching the description nearby. He was positively identified as the suspect and arrested for vandalism.*
- *On Monday morning, an officer stopped a vehicle for a traffic infraction. During the investigation, the officer located drugs, drug paraphernalia and numerous stolen mail and identification cards. Although several of the subjects lied about their name, they were eventually identified. A parolee, probationer and 3 other subjects were booked for possession of stolen property, possession of methamphetamine, possession of drug paraphernalia and various warrants.*
- *On Monday, an officer located a stolen vehicle that had driven through a license plate reader. The driver, a parolee for home invasion robbery, was booked for possession of stolen property and a parole violation.*
- *On Tuesday morning, an officer located a stolen vehicle that had went through a stationary license plate reader. The vehicle had been stolen in Ontario on 08/17/2015. The driver of the vehicle was arrested for grand theft auto and receiving stolen property.*
- *On Tuesday morning, UPD received several calls of a vehicle on fire and a male subject was seen leaving the area on foot. An officer located the subject and it was later determined the subject broke into the vehicle and stole items before he set it on fire. He was arrested for burglary and arson, and booked at juvenile hall.*
- *On Thursday afternoon, a police captain was driving near Foothill Blvd. and Campus Ave. when he saw smoke rising from the back of a closed business. Upon further checking, a small homeless camp was found fully engulfed. The fire was so hot officers could not approach until extinguished by the fire department. The small camp was a total loss but the businesses surrounding were undamaged.*
- *On Thursday evening, officers learned of a stolen vehicle driving in the Mountain Ave. and 7th Street area. This vehicle was located in a business complex along Mountain Ave. and the driver taken into custody for grand theft auto without incident.*
- *On Thursday evening, a bear was spotted walking in the area of 24th Street and San Antonio Ave. Officers responded and watched as the bear continued on its way without making any threatening gestures. Residents in the area were told of the bear's presence for their own safety. The SBSO had a unit on-scene as the bear entered the San Antonio Heights community. State Fish and Game was also notified.*
- *On Friday, officers were called to a large discount store for a shoplifter being detained. Officers arrived and learned the 17-year-old female not only was a thief, but was wanted for being a runaway and also wanted for a felony assault warrant. The female was gladly provided a ride to San Bernardino County Juvenile Hall.*

- *On Saturday, an officer stopped a vehicle for a traffic violation. During the stop, the officer located numerous credit cards, driver licenses and other property taken in burglaries from Claremont, San Antonio Heights, Rancho Cucamonga and Upland. The suspect, a habitual thief and known drug user and peddler, has been arrested 7 times by UPD since January 2015. This same suspect was recently located in Upland by Upland officers after committing several car burglaries in Glendora, but was released pending a trial for burglary and possession of heroin. Many of the previous arrests would have been charged as felonies prior to Prop 47, but now this known recidivist criminal receives almost no punishment and is released back into the community to continue causing havoc. In this instance, the suspect was booked for possession of stolen property.*

 - *During this reporting period, 20 hours of focused traffic enforcement was worked and 37 citations were issued.*

- **Summary:**
 - *On Sunday morning, officers were dispatched to a possible hit and run traffic collision with injuries in the parking lot of Wal-Mart at 1540 W. Foothill. Upon arrival, officers determined the incident was not a traffic collision but instead a case of road rage turned violent. The driver of a full size pick-up truck ran over the driver of a motorhome. The suspect backed up and drove over the victim a second time. The driver fled eastbound on Foothill Blvd. The victim was taken to Arrowhead Regional Medical Center where he was treated for a collapsed lung, lacerated scalp and a broken elbow. The investigation*

into the incident is ongoing and will be turned over to the Detective Bureau.

- *On Tuesday night, officers were dispatched to a domestic incident in a home. A very elderly couple had allowed their 60-year-old alcoholic son to live with them. The son assaulted his father who then fell over on top of his wife, causing them both to fall to the floor. The father called UPD. The son was arrested for felony elderly abuse. Both parents suffered minor injuries.*
- *On Thursday evening, a male resident of an Upland apartment complex walked into the leasing office and exposed himself. Responding officers located him at his apartment and arrested him.*
- *On Thursday night, officers were dispatched to a residence involving a fight between multiple family members. The reporting party stated that one of these subjects had armed himself with a knife and was in the front yard. When officers arrived, they detained several people and located the discarded knife. Their investigation revealed a 50-year-old male had made criminal threats against others in the family. He was arrested for this charge.*
- *On Friday afternoon, a single suspect armed with a handgun robbed an Upland business in the 800 block of E. Foothill. The suspect entered the business and demanded the money from the cash register before fleeing. Officers were unable to locate the suspect.*
- *On Saturday, a neighbor called stating their house and car had just been broken into. The two male suspects had fled on foot. Officers checked the area and located one suspect who was identified by a witness. The juvenile suspect was arrested and transported to juvenile hall.*

- *Summer Swim has come and gone, and staff did an outstanding job teaching children and adults how to swim. Staff received constant thanks throughout the summer from many residents and non-residents. There was a total of 1,071 participants in swim classes this year. There were also 48 participants in the Competitive Swim Camp and Water Polo Camp, and 6 adults in the Adult Swim Clinic. Next year's signups are in May 2016, so don't miss out.*
